MILITARY PHONE CARD DONATION PROGRAM GOES PUBLIC

The "Help Our Troops Call Home" program is designed to assist service members calling home from Southwest Asia.

To donate a prepaid calling card to a servicemember, people can log on to the exchange Web site at www.aafes.com and click the 'Help Our Troops Call Home' link.

From there, a prepaid calling card may be purchased for an individual at his or her deployed address or for "any servicemember" deployed or hospitalized. The exchanges operate telephone call centers in Iraq, Kuwait, Afghanistan, other countries and aboard ships. The cards never expire and there are no added charges or connection fees

OFFICIALS STRESS NEED TO UPDATE DEERS

Release No. 04-15-04 April 20, 2004

Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) officials emphasized this week the importance of updating records when personal eligibility information changes, and noted several ways changes may be made.

Eligibility changes include changes in military career status and family status such as marriage, divorce, birth and adoption. Beneficiaries may update their DEERS address, telephone number, and e-mail address through several methods:

- * DEERS Web site at <https://www.dmdc.osd.mil/appj/address/index.jsp>. It's quick and easy and the best time to update is during non-peak hours.
- * Visit a local personnel office that has a uniformed service ID card facility. To locate the nearest ID card facility, visit www.dmdc.osd.mil/rsl/. Call ahead for hours of operation and for instructions to update a record for someone who is housebound.
- * Fax address changes to 1 (831) 655-8317.
- * Call the Defense Manpower Data Center Support Office (DSO) Telephone Center at 1 (800) 538-9552 or for the Deaf (TTY/TDD): 1-866-363-2883. Hours of operation are 6 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. (Pacific time), Monday through Friday, except Federal holidays.
- * Mail the changed information to the DSO, ATTN: COA, 400 Gigling Road, Seaside, California 93955-6771.

Updating Information other than addresses. Beneficiaries need to provide important pieces of documentation, such as marriage, birth, or death certificates; DD 214s; DD 1172s; etc. Beneficiaries should contact the nearest military ID card facility to find out what documents are needed.

Once beneficiaries have the necessary documents, they can present them at the ID card facility or send a letter or fax to the DSO at the address and number noted above.

Unremarried former spouses should note that they are now listed in DEERS under their own Social Security number and not that of the sponsor.

TROOPS TO TEACHERS: SERVICE AFTER THE MILITARY

LONDON (NNS) -- Representatives from the Troops to Teachers (TTT) program visited Commander, U.S. Naval Forces Europe headquarters building April 20, to inform Sailors of a possible second career, "serving students."

Attendees were able to gain insight into the process of becoming a teacher, including certification requirements and job opportunities. . . .

However, many Sailors may already qualify to become a vocational /technical teacher. Sailors only need the equivalent of one year of college courses and six years of experience in a vocational or technical field to begin the certification process..

Military members from all of the armed forces can use tuition assistance for their teaching certification while on active duty. Members may also be eligible for financial assistance for teacher certification expenses. A commitment to teach for three years in a "high-need" school district or at a high school with a high percentage of low-income families is part of the obligation for receiving some forms of financial aid.

There are 33 state TTT offices nationwide that offer placement assistance for the 45 states participating in the program. Offices can assist Sailors with state certification requirements. Sailors can take advantage of the TTT Web site, www.ProudToServeAgain.com, to correspond with representatives and receive alternative certification information.

"It's important to focus on where you want to teach, to start checking what your state's requirements are. Teacher certification is done state-to-state, not nationally. But some states will recognize another state's certification," said John Gantz, director of the TTT program.

The military members who have become teachers have established a good reputation for the program with school administrators and principals... . "Schools are looking for a stronger presence of male and minority teachers at the elementary level. A lot of kids are being raised by one parent, and schools are looking for positive role models to help fill that void," added Gantz.

Teaching positions are available at the elementary, middle and high school levels in suburban, small towns, rural and inner-city areas. There is a higher demand for math, science and special education teachers. Positions for other subjects are obtainable, but applicants may need to be more flexible with location.

Sailors can consult their TTT representative on job availabilities, or check the Department of Education Web site at www.teachers-teachers.com. The Web site lists teaching vacancies for each state.

HEROES, THE WORLD'S BEST COAST GUARD

Abbie Burgess

was assistant light keeper at Matinicus Rock Light from 1854 to 1872, and at Whitehead Light Station until 1890. She stood watch through the hardships and discomforts at the desolate Maine islands for 37 of her 52 years.

Her career began with her father's appointment as keeper of Matinicus Rock Light in 1853. Abbie, her parents, her brother Benjy and three younger sisters moved out to the isolated and rocky island known as Matinicus Rock. Having grown up in nearby Rockland, the move presented a major change in their lives.

Abbie's brother Benjy was frequently off on fishing trips, so it fell to Abbie to learn how to tend and operate the lights. Soon she became proficient enough to act as her father's assistant keeper.

Occasionally Capt. Burgess had to go to Matinicus Island, the nearest human habitation, for supplies, such as medicine for his sick wife, food for the family, consumable stores for the lights and feed for the chickens. Burgess was comfortable leaving Abbie behind to handle the lights during the night or two while he was gone. She was a big strong girl, as capable as any man at filling the lanterns, trimming the wicks, and cleaning the lenses of the lights in the two separate towers, and she didn't mind the responsibility.

In 1856, just after Captain Burgess had begun a trip, one of the largest storms of the 19th Century hit Matinicus Rock Light. Abbie moved her mother and sisters into one of the towers as the island was flooded by gigantic waves. Once, she rushed out into the flood to rescue the family's hens, then hurried back to the tower only moments before an enormous wave swept over the island, destroying the keeper's quarters.

For nearly a month, the weather kept Abbie's father away. For Abbie, the time dragged on as the wind and waves battered the wooden structures without relief. Nevertheless, in addition to attending to her three sisters and her sick mother, Abbie made the long climb up the steep tower stairs to light the lights every day. The storm eventually subsided, and Abbie continued to help her father with the light until he lost his position in 1860.

She stayed on to help the new keeper, and fell in love with his son, Isaac Grant. When Grant became keeper, Abbie was officially listed as his assistant, and received \$440 a year for her services. In 1872, they were transferred to Whitehead Light Station. They served together as keepers until their retirement in 1890.

DoD EXPANDING NEWS FOR TROOPS

The Defense Department is launching two internal communication vehicles: a free electronic version of the "Stars and Stripes" newspaper, effective May 1; and world-wide access to the department's TV service, the Pentagon Channel, beginning May 14. The electronic "Stars and Stripes," allows service members to view copies of the newspaper's European, Pacific and Mideast editions.

For the first time, members in the U.S. have access to this online newspaper, where the hardcopy newspaper is not printed. It's at <http://estripes.osd.mil>.

The Pentagon Channel, previously available only in the Pentagon and through the American Forces Radio and Television Service for service members assigned overseas, also will be distributed 24/7 to military installations in all 50 states via a domestic satellite. DoD is also offering the Pentagon Channel to all cable and satellite providers.

TREASURY, IRS WARN OF IDENTITY THEFT SCHEME INVOLVING BOGUS E-MAIL, WEB SITE

IR-2004-60, April 30, 2004

WASHINGTON - The U.S. Department of the Treasury and the Internal Revenue Service today warned taxpayers of an e-mail-based scheme that attempts to trick taxpayers into revealing personal information such as social security numbers, driver's license information and bank and credit card numbers.

In this ploy, unsuspecting consumers receive an e-mail, claiming they are under investigation for tax fraud and are subject to prosecution. The e-mail informs recipients they can "help" the investigation by providing "real" information and directs them to an official-looking Web site, <http://deptreas.org/irs/7634/>, where detailed personal information must be provided to dispute the charge.

Identity thieves can use an individual's personal data to take over their financial accounts, run up charges on their credit cards, apply for loans, credit cards or other services in the victim's name and file fraudulent tax returns.

At the request of the IRS and the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration (TIGTA), the Internet service provider that was hosting the Web site has shut the site down. The scheme is being investigated by TIGTA, which addresses threats to federal tax administration.

The bogus IRS web page and the e-mail in this instance contained several grammatical errors, rendering them immediately suspect. However, new versions of the scam could surface in the future, including more effectively-written text and a different destination Web site.

The IRS does not use e-mail to contact taxpayers about issues related to their accounts. Official taxpayer contact usually includes a letter on IRS stationery in an IRS envelope. IRS letters also contain a contact phone number.

Taxpayers who believe they have received suspect communication are encouraged to call TIGTA's toll-free fraud referral hotline at 1-800-366-4484. Taxpayers can also contact the IRS at 1-800-829-1040. An IRS representative will be able to verify the taxpayer's account status and determine whether a communication is legitimate.

OPEN SEASON

A new open season for the Thrift Savings Plan runs from April 15 until June 30.

TSP is a tax-deferred savings option that lowers the taxable income for participants in the 2004 tax year. The limit for contribution for service members is the lower of 9 percent of pay or \$13,000 for 2004, a \$1,000 increase from 2003.

Participants may direct TSP investments to any of the following five funds which vary in risk and investment mixture: government securities investment (G fund); fixed income investment (F fund), common stock index investment (C fund), small capitalization stock index investment (S fund) and international stock index investment (I fund).

Members can enroll in TSP online through the my Pay Web site at <https://mypay.dfas.mil/mypay.aspx>, or by completing a TSP enrollment form (TSP-U-1).

SPACE-A TRAVEL FOR FAMILIES EXTENDED

The one-year test to expand space-available travel privileges to family members of active-duty and retired service members traveling within the continental United States has been extended until further notice, according to Air Mobility Command's air transportation division officials. The extension will allow the test to continue while Defense officials complete their evaluation of the test. Under the space-A test, family members of active-duty and retired service members may travel space-A aboard military flights when accompanied by their sponsors, said John Lundebj, of the passenger policy branch. He said the test does not apply to gray-area retirees -- Guard and Reserve members who are retired but are not yet eligible for retired pay and benefits. To register for space-A travel, active-duty sponsors must be on leave or pass and remain in such status while awaiting travel and through the entire travel period, officials said. INVOLUNTARY EXTENSIONS BRING BUCKS

Some 20,000 soldiers who were involuntarily extended in Iraq and Kuwait for up to 90 days beyond their 12-month rotation date qualify for \$1,000 a month in extra pay for the period of their extensions.

The extra pay breaks down to \$200 more a month in hardship duty pay and 800 monthly in assignment-incentive pay. G1 compensation chief Lt. Col. Gerald Barrett said that, contrary to earlier reports, no stabilization-tour option will be offered in lieu of the \$800 AIP. The extra pay will only be available once a soldier exceeds 365 consecutive days in the Central Command theater.

That's 12 consecutive months or 365 days out of a 15-month period, said Barrett. "It will not be pro-rated," Barrett said about the extra pay, explaining that soldiers who serve one day of the extension period will receive the extra pay for the entire month.

GROUPS ARRANGE FOSTER CARE FOR MILITARY PETS

WASHINGTON (NNS) -- Deploying overseas means leaving friends and loved ones behind. For service members with no one to take care of their beloved dog, cat, bird or other pet, it once meant also having to abandon or turn the pet over to a shelter - never to see it again.

Thanks to two nonprofit groups - the Military Pets Foster Project and Operation Noble Foster - service members can now arrange foster care for their pets while they're gone.

The Military Pets Foster Project, a nonprofit group founded by animal lover Steve Albin, has placed about 15,000 pets in foster homes throughout the United States while their owners serve in Iraq and Afghanistan. Operation Noble Foster, which specializes in foster homes for cats, has found temporary homes for about 25 military cats a month since shortly after Sept. 11, 2001, according to founder Linda Mercer. . . . Albin said he matches pets in need of foster care with appropriate foster homes and requires those involved in the arrangement to sign a foster agreement.

. . . Mark Delman from Parker, Colo., signed up through Operation Noble Foster to provide a foster home for five cats owned by a military family currently stationed in Germany. Delman said he encourages others to open their doors, as well.

"These people are keeping us safe and free, and shouldn't have to give up their beloved pets to do so," he said. "Offering a foster home is a way of saying 'thanks.' I tell people not to hesitate to do it."

Albin encourages service members in need of foster care for their pets to give the Military Pets Foster Project as much notice as possible of their upcoming deployment so the group can find a suitable home.

- The counselors have information and referrals at their fingertips and can help provide information to many segments of the military population i.e. active duty, retired, national guard, air national guard, reservists, deployed civilians, their family members and concerned others who don't have a military ID, but are still concerned about their nephew, niece, grand son/daughter, and the like.
- Each operation received training in understanding how each service performs it's mission and a little about the life in each branch. The call is confidential and if necessary, paid referrals to counseling can be made if necessary.
